Hailstones Fell without Rain

For lovers of Elizabeth Acevedo and Angie Cruz comes this extraordinary debut novel from Uruguayan-Australian author Natalia Figueroa Barroso. The power of *Hailstones Fell without Rain* lies in its pacy, multi-generational story and its memorable, wise and sharply funny characters.

Graciela is a Uruguayan migrant struggling to raise her three daughters in Western Sydney: her life feels like just one bill after another, and she's reaching breaking point. Chula, her elderly aunt, is still waiting for justice after living through the civic-military coup of 1973 in Uruguay. And Rita, Graciela's eldest daughter, wants to escape the constraints of her family but finds herself indelibly tied to the ghosts of her mother's past.

Dazzling, multilayered and often laugh-out-loud funny, *Hailstones Fell without Rain* tells the story of these three indomitable women from one working-class family. As the novel moves across time and place, from Western Sydney to Uruguay and back again, we realise that buried secrets and family trauma always, ultimately, resurface but also that it's possible for broken connections to mend.



Natalia Figueroa Barroso is a writer of Uruguayan descent with Charrúa, Yoruba and Iberian origins. She was born on Dharug Ngura, and was raised between her birthland and her homeland. She is a member of Sweatshop Literacy Movement

and her essays, poems and short stories have been published widely.

The Eagle and the Crow

A unique exploration into Indigenous ways of knowing, being and relating, with an in-depth focus on kinship systems and how their cyclical nature foiled attempts by missionaries to destroy them.

Part instruction manual and part philosophical text, *The Eagle and the Crow* is a profound work of First Nations knowledge and research. Written as a series of lyric essays, JM Field's book traverses Gamilaraay conceptions of time and place, the ways English can quietly disrupt languages and cultures, and the form and practical functions of kinship systems. Most importantly, Field's fascinating insights from mathematics offer a map for the revitalisation of Gamilaraay social structures once prohibited during the Missionary Era. Generous yet restrained, this collection is an important act of resistance.





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Teacher (Affirm, 2023) and The Beehive (Walker Books, 2024).



Meanwhile Hannah, who is juggling the demands of new motherhood and family trauma, fights racism in the newsroom. With a focus on two of today's most contested fields, academia and the media, *Discipline* tallies the price we all pay when those with privilege choose to remain silent.





When Sonny and Tess crash into each other outside the shop, sparks and dim sims fly. Soon they're both wondering if the other feels the same way – but, as Sonny loves to say, it's complicated. Over hot chips and chicken salt, can these two work out what they really want?

Nova Weetman lives in Melbourne with her family. She has written for TV and is the award-winning author of many middle grade and young adult novels including *Sick Bay, The Secrets We Keep, The Secrets We Share, The Edge of Thirteen, The Jammer* and more. *The Secrets We Keep* was shortlisted for the Readings Children's Book Prize, the Speech Pathology Australia Book of the Year Awards and the ABIA Awards, and was named a CBCA Notable Book. The sequel,

The Secrets We Share, was a 2018 CBCA Notable Book and won the KROC Kids Reading Oz Choice Awards, NT – Best Fiction for Years 7 to 9. It was also shortlisted for the Speech Pathology Australia Book of the Year Awards. Nova's middle grade novel Sick Bay was a CBCA Notable Book, was shortlisted for the ABIA Awards and Japan's Sakura Medal, and won the YABBA Awards Fiction for Years 7 to 9.





All day long we can hear that Sea howl prowling wild inside our brains and every part of us is straining to feel it taste it twirl it whirl it swirl it inside our body again.



in creative writing, and degrees in history and teaching. Zana's passion for empowering young people to find their voice is a feature of both her books and her work with writers of all ages.


